Lygia Clark's first show at Luhring Augustine—which earlier this year announced co-representation of the late Brazilian artist with London's Alison Jacques Gallery—is a coda of sorts to her sprawling retrospective at the Museum of Modern Art in summer 2014. Titled "Modulated Space," it includes dozens of abstract, geometric drawings from the late 1950s that exist in tandem with her movable metal sculptures known at "Bichos" ("critters" in Portuguese). In the gallery's back room is a low vitrine filled with delicate paper and wood maquettes. Clark intended for her "Bichos" to be folded and manipulated, turning early exhibitions into quasi performances or events. Here, several large metal pieces are installed on circular whitefoam platforms resting on metal bases. No touching allowed. —*Leigh Anne Miller*
